Student-led Conferences

Thanks to our wonderful community for your contribution and support during our recent Evaluation process.



Reporting on student learning at Good Shepherd Lutheran College includes continuous reporting, three-way conferences, end of semester reporting and student-led conferences. Our student-led conferences are taking place this term in Week 9 on Monday 12 and Tuesday 13 September. Further information will be provided to parents through Signmee.

Several families are in the classroom at the same time for the 25-minute booking, as students share with their parents and lead the process by discussing their learning goals they have set prior to the evening from identified areas for growth. Parents are more informed when they understand the learning goals their child is working towards and contribute to their child's joy of learning and growth as a successful learner.



Students and teachers set and reset learning goals that are personalised for each student and connect new learning to prior learning. Learning goals are revisited throughout the learning process to monitor progress but are highlighted to parents through the conference process.

In PYP schools, personal learning goals support the creation of high expectations by:

- making learning transparent to the teacher, the student and their families
- building a shared understanding of what learning is to be achieved
- encouraging reflection and focused feedback
- inviting students to take ownership of their own learning.






Empathy

Often, we ask our students to think about how the other person would have felt or is feeling. This can be a challenging skill to ask a young student to do but it is vital to developing positive relationships throughout our life. Empathy means more than treating others better—it means doing better. In a time characterized by connectivity and change, students who learn to forge and navigate relationships in the classroom will thrive in tomorrow's workroom and boardroom. Empathizing with the feelings and perspectives of others is the foundation for good communication, teamwork, and strong leadership—no matter what path they take, or what jobs they undertake, in the future.

So how do we teach this? First, we have to model it to our children and use the language of 'I can see you are upset, I would be as well'. We can also ask them if something like that has happened to them before? E.g. Have you ever lost something special to you? This helps them to have an emotional connection towards a situation.

Another activity is to help others within the household or community. Helping others develop kindness and caring. It can also give children the opportunity to interact with people of diverse backgrounds, ages, and circumstances, making it easier to show empathy for all people. And lastly it is essential we praise our children when they display empathy.

Icy Poles are sold every Friday afternoon after school in front of the Admin building.








Book Week

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YEAR 3


This term we have been working on 3D objects and fractions.

Math is very hands on and there is room in math for creativity through exploration. The class was asked to make fractions of their choice, using the materials of their choice. As you can see from the photo below, Jayden made a fraction using chairs. There were eight chairs and he sat on one of them, demonstrating one eighth. Next, they were asked to explore fractions using playdough and paper plates. Many of the students combined the two together to demonstrate a smaller and larger fraction, or several fractions from smallest to largest.

In Year 3, the Australian Curriculum requires students to be able to construct 3D objects. The children had the option of again using different materials and either working individually, in pairs or in groups.

In Christian Studies, we've been exploring the life of Paul from the New Testament. The children had a go at recounting his life in comic strip format. Siyona did an awesome job.



Reading in the Early Years

Segmenting, blending and phoneme manipulation are the targeted skills for all of our readers.

When you are reading with your child, use these skills to prompt their decoding. Remember, these skills are transferrable to more complex spellings as well.

Example: spray /s/ /p/ /r/ /ay/ fright /f/ /r/ /igh/ /t/

THREE VITAL SKILLS FOR LEARNING TO READ AND WRITE



Segmenting – the ability to pull apart the individual sounds in words.

Example: pig /p/ /i/ /g/

Blending – the ability to push sounds together to build words.

Example: /k/ /a/ /t/ cat

Phoneme manipulation – the ability to insert sounds into and delete sounds out of words. This skill is necessary to test out alternatives for spellings that represent more than one sound.

Example: spelling < o >. Is it /o/ as in hot, /oe/ as in no, /oo/ as in to, or /u/ as in son?

Comprehension at Home

Comprehension is the ability to understand text in written, verbal and visual form. It is a complex process that involves simultaneously extracting and constructing meaning from a text.

These **Comprehension Critters** are one way to help build your child's comprehension skills and can be used with written, verbal and visual texts.

Spinner the Spider Make connections



Think about what you already know

> text to self text to text text to world

Text to self:

Has something like this happened to me before? Can I connect to how a character is feeling? Can I connect to something a character has done?

Text to text:

Does this remind me something in a previous text? It might be something written, verbal or visual.

Text to world:

Does this connect to the world around me? Is something like this happening in the world or has something like this happened in history?

Jabber the Reteller Think and retell



Think about what you read. Retell the story or what you learned in your own words.

Being able to recall and retell a story helps with our short term memory. Depending on the text, we are looking to see if the reader can:

FICTION

- Identify key characters
- Setting, conflict, resolution
- Other key events

NON-FICTION

- Identify the topic/theme
- Author's purpose and main idea
- Supporting details (3-4)

Fix-up Bear

Think... Does it make sense?




When it doesn't make sense or you don't understand, read it again and fix-up

As our readers build their reading skills (segmenting, blending, phoneme manipulation) and comprehension skills, it's OK to make mistakes. If we always correct them mid-sentence they won't be able to recognise their own mistakes.

At the end of a page (or, in a bigger book, paragraph or sentence), pause your reader and ask "Did that make sense?" If they say no, prompt them to re-read to fix it up OR they can ask for the meaning of a word.

See pictures of the story in your head. What do the characters look like?

It can be difficult for some to "see" pictures in their head. You could ask your reader to draw a setting or character OR if you have dolls at home you could use them to represent different characters.

Ask questions about the story

> Think about who what where when why how

We want our readers to ask specific questions using who, what, where, when, why and how. Often, these questions will have a real life application and help your reader link the story to their own lives. For example, they may ask "How long does it take to get to the moon?" "What food are the eating? What does it taste like?"

lggy the Inferring Iguana Infer while you read



Make predictions and think... What's the author's message.

Inferring can be difficult for our young readers. It requires readers to 'deduce' or 'conclude' using evidence from the text rather than from explicit statements.

For example: "This made Lucy mad" – this explicit statement tells us how the character feels. "Lucy felt her face go red and her heart beat faster" – we can infer the characters feelings based on our own experiences


