












































Strauss Day - Friday 31 March

Leo was on work experience at Larrikin Interactive in Week 9 of Term 2, which he described as "his dream job".


Working with two of Larrikins lead designers, Leo was in his element when visited by College staff on his very first day of work experience; Monday 3 April.
























Getting Creative in Senior School



Chaplain Kyle's Easter Message

This term in Chapel, we have reflected on the times in scripture where Jesus was **countercultural**. We focused on the challenges of His time and how they can still be challenging for us today. We explored topics such as Jesus seeing **value in children** when others didn't, Jesus seeing value in all people and wanting to share meals with outsiders. The challenge of **loving your enemies** and the ability to **forgive people** who hurt you.

Leading up to Easter, we have also explored the question, 'why is Good Friday called Good Friday if it's a time used to reflect on the terrible torment that Jesus faced?' There seems to be nothing good about that, right? The simple response to this question is; while we do reflect on the horrible things that happened to Jesus on Easter Friday, it is called Good Friday; not because Jesus suffered but because of what his suffering means for us. Because Jesus died on the cross, we don't have to do anything to be right with God. We don't have to follow a 'perfect' person check list and gain his favour through good deeds. Jesus has done the work on the cross. He is the sacrifice that was required for our wrong doings. It is only through him that we now can have a relationship with God.

This Easter when you have your hot cross buns and your hollow Easter eggs, use them as a reminder of what the **true meaning of Easter** is really about. The hot cross buns represent Jesus' death on the cross and the hollow Easter eggs represent the tomb that

was empty - Jesus is no longer dead but risen! My hope and prayer this Easter is that God would bless each and every family over the break and that we would truly reflect on what Jesus has done for us.




