
















T-1-2 ATHIETICS FUN DAY

HTWW: FORCES

Designing and Building Toys

In How the world works, we have been learning about FORCES in the world - push, pull, magnetic forces, gravity, buoyancy and twist.

Daly & Anderson - We made a Monster Truck that uses magnetic force to pull another truck out of the mud.

Isobel & Hannah — We used *pull*. We made a Tug-O-War out of wool. We had to finger knit it into a rope.

Hamish & Marley — We built a boat out of bottles and cardboard and we tested it on water. It didn't work the first time so we re-built it. It uses push because you push the boat and buoyancy.

Jack I. & Jase — We built a raft out of foam and paddle pop sticks. It uses push and buoyancy.

Sam - I built a jet with cardboard and cellophane. I used a lot of sticky tape to hold everything together. I uses push and gravity.














Chloe & Jethro — We build a Bey Blade stadium and little Bey Blades. We painted it yellow on the inside and purple on the outside. It uses twist.

Madeleine – I made a train. It uses *push*. It was supposed to use *magnetic* force but I couldn't get it to work.

Jack M - I made dominoes. I used lots of paper and lots of sticky tape. It uses push and gravity.

Gabriel – I made a boat with a cardboard box and some paddle pop sticks. I used the forces push and buoyancy. The straws on the bottom did not stop the cardboard getting wet.

Magenta & Mahuika — We built a pin ball machine. It uses push and pull and gravity. We decorated it with pompoms and jewels.

YEAR 3

Year 3 at Palmerston Campus have been involved in a very important initiative this term. The class combined their unit of inquiry, How we organise ourselves with their Christian Studies inquiry on service learning. Leading up to their business day, Red for Refugee Day, the class had a refugee experience half day on the 26 May. The children with lunch orders were slightly worried that they would miss out on their food at lunchtime, but luckily for them, we finished our refugee experience at recess time. They started off the day by sitting on a mat on the verandah. They had one Bible to share. Their verse was aimed at giving the message of treating all people with respect and love.

Leviticus 19:33-34

Suppose an outsider lives with you in your land. Then do not treat them badly. Treat them as if they were one of your own people. Love them as you love yourself. Remember that all of you were outsiders in Egypt. I am the Lord your God.

Next, the children had a go at handwriting with chalk on the concrete. They had to rule their own dotted thirds, sharing the 10 rulers that were given to the Refugee School Camp by a community member

This was followed by making their own football out of rags and string. Two groups were formed, and they had to work together to construct a football, make the rules for the game and then play it.

I asked the children at the end of the day what they had learned about refugees and camp life. Pippa's comment summed up the general consensus: "Life as a refugee is hard."

On the following Tuesday, they had a zoom talk with Celia from Australian Lutheran World Service. Here Celia showed the photos of refugees in camps and gave them lots of statistics like; 1 million people are born as refugees. Some people live up to 15 years in a refugee camp and their food rations need to last for two weeks. They are lucky to have enough food to eat twice a day. The food is mainly beans and rice.

Using this information from Celia, the children devised what they would sell, what they would like to raise money for and what information they would give to others to raise awareness about the refugees that exist in our global community. A business plan was written up and presented to Mrs Trathen. Posters were created to advertise the business day. Some Year 3 children spoke at Assembly about Red for Refugee Day and why it is important to be aware of refugees in the world.

On 16 June, the Year 3s, held their Red for Refugee Day. They sold some beautiful red scrunchies (kindly made and donated by Imahni's mum, Kahdi), handmade knitted red bracelets and red bookmarks. They also sold red foods, such as, hot dogs, watermelon, jelly cups and ice cups. Thank you to Marie-Clare Boothby's office for donating money towards this initiative.

The children then looked at how much money was raised and how much can be donated, after covering the costs of buying materials. The funds raised will go to the Australian Lutheran World Service, who will ensure the money is passed on to help refugees in Ukraine.

Well done 3RK on caring for the global community and being concerned citizens. You did an amazing job at alerting your fellow peers on what it is like to be a refugee.








LITTLE LAMBS PLAY GROUP


Pastor Noel is very keen to work with our College as well, and we
