In the Early Years Learning Framework (EYLF) that guides all Australian schools on the teaching and learning approach for our youngest students it shares 'Belonging' as the first component for educators to establish with students and families. Personally, I think this approach resonates well with people of all ages and settings. We all feel valued when we have a sense of belonging to something and with others. Knowing we are in an environment where people care, listen, include, and support us provides the foundation to feeling safe and having the confidence to be our best and become who we aspire to be.

Schools cultivate belonging in many ways depending on the age and stage of the student. At a whole school level this is achieved through inclusion in camps, events, assemblies, inviting students to make contributions towards activities and spaces, wearing a uniform to build connection, sharing traditions and celebrating successes with each other. Then there will be unique components appropriate to the age group, for example we celebrate Mother's Day and Father's Day because our students adore and value the connection between home and school. This is another foundational value from the EYLF that I wholeheartedly support – families are children's first and most influential educators.

At a classroom level, teachers cultivate a sense of belonging every day for students. Greeting students by their name each morning, displaying student work around the classroom, students sharing stories of their hobbies or holidays and celebrating special occasions together like birthdays and accomplishments. Again, knowing and valuing each individual student and their part within the broader community helps to foster a sense of belonging.

As I begin my journey here at Howard Springs Good Shepherd Junior School, I thought it would be fitting to acknowledge the value we each bring to our school community and the sense of belonging that drives our being and becoming. I extend a warm welcome to the new families who joined our community this term, please feel comfortable contacting either your child's classroom teacher or myself if you have any questions as you settle into the school community. To our new colleagues in the Junior School, Mrs Tan teaching in Year Two, Mrs Pearn teaching across a number of classrooms and Mrs Murphy coming back from maternity leave and joining the Lutheran Support Officer team, I wish you a fulfilling semester ahead working with students, families and colleagues.

Student-led conferences

Thanks to our wonderful community for your contribution and support during our recent Evaluation process.

Reporting on student learning at Good Shepherd Lutheran College includes continuous reporting, three-way conferences, end of semester reporting and student-led conferences. Our student-led conferences are taking place this term in Week 9 on Monday 12 and Tuesday 13 September. Further information will be provided to parents through Signmee.

Several families are in the classroom at the same time for the 25-minute booking, as students share with their parents and lead the process by discussing their learning goals they have set prior to the evening from identified areas for growth. Parents are more informed when they understand the learning goals their child is working towards and contribute to their child's joy of learning and growth as a successful learner.

Students and teachers set and reset learning goals that are personalised for each student and connect new learning to prior learning. Learning goals are revisited throughout the learning process to monitor progress but are highlighted to parents through the conference process.

In PYP schools, personal learning goals support the creation of high expectations by:

- making learning transparent to the teacher, the student and their families
- building a shared understanding of what learning is to be achieved
- encouraging reflection and focused feedback
- inviting students to take ownership of their own learning.





Science experiment fun!

In **5MM**, we linked our Unit of Inquiry with our writing and learnt how to write a scientific report. First, we had to learn about the scientific method; we asked a question, shared our hypothesis and then tested it. We had to be observant and record the results. Then we had to use our thinking skills to describe and analyse the results. A few things we discovered is that a skittle will dissolve quicker in warm water than cold water. Balloons won't pop if you stick tape to it and put the pin through the tape, but only at the top or bottom of the balloon! And if you have shaving cream in a glass on top of water, when you add food colouring it will go through the cream like rain and make the shaving cream rise, like a storm!















Procedural texts and buddies

Year 5 wrote a procedural text for our Transition buddies. We first had to decide what we wanted to teach our buddies, then we learnt the importance of clear and specific instructions. We took all the materials and ingredients needed to visit our buddies. They had a lot of fun learning how to make fairy bread, make a paper plane, how to draw different things and even how to plant a seed. This was a fun activity for both Year 5's and the transition students.















Hi from 3DL and 3AH

We are nearing the completion of the current unit Where We Are in Place and Time. The students have enjoyed learning about what their cultural histories are and how things change. They particularly enjoyed learning some of the family cultures, and how these things aren't wrong, just different.

The students deepened their understanding of number knowledge through odd and even are about to embark their journey through 3D shapes. Following that we will be investigating angles.

Year 3 has been co-writing auto/biographies and are building skills in writing these more independently.

One of the highlights of the Term is the Year 3 sleepover. A lot of fun will be had as we get to know each other even better.

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

Within each square, he paints concentric circles, meaning that the circles share a central point. Kandinsky believed the circle had symbolic significance relating to the mysteries of the cosmos and used it as an abstract form. The Year 4's applied this technique and also demonstrated juxtaposition of highly saturated, vibrant colours to energise their paintings.




























Updated College App


