Primary Years Programme

It is with great excitement that the Year 5 students at each of our Junior Schools have started the process of Exhibition following a combined workshop time together after cross country earlier this term. The Exhibition is the culmination of the students' years in the Primary Years Programme and the opportunity for them to demonstrate the essential elements of the PYP. The students work collaboratively with their peers, teachers and mentor to investigate and offer solutions to real-world issues (often related to the UN Sustainable Development Goals). All members of our school community have important roles to play in the Exhibition process.

The students saw some powerful imagery to get them considering some of the issues faced by communities or the impact that humans have had on the world. The students looked at the definition of the transdisciplinary theme 'Sharing the planet' and brainstormed some of the potential areas they could research for their exhibit.



The Exhibition should clearly provide the opportunity for students to participate and be assessed in an authentic learning situation—where the central idea(s) are specifically about a real-life issue or problem. This includes ongoing and rigorous assessment of the Exhibition process in two forms: firstly, ongoing assessment of each individual student's contribution to and understanding of the Exhibition; secondly, a summative assessment and reflection on the event itself.

Reflections on the Exhibition from different members of the learning community support and enrich the self-assessment experience for students. We look forward to our school community supporting the Exhibition on Wednesday 30 November at the Cornerstone Church, Howard Springs.









In **2JA** we have delved straight into our new unit of inquiry 'How We Organise Ourselves' where students have been inquiring into the central idea of 'Products go through different processes'. Students examined different products and used their writing to consolidate their understanding of the Central Idea. Throughout this unit we have been looking at procedure texts. Students have been creating their own procedures and following recipes to make fairy bread, chocolate balls and playdough!

















In **2LT** we have been inquiry into our Unit of Inquiry 'How we Express Ourselves'. Students have been busy exploring different types of expression whether it be art, music, dance or drama. Students chose to express themselves through drama in our chapel performance; Students worked in teams to create skits showing how to respect one another in different scenarios.



























This term students have been exploring the central idea: Communities are affected by the distribution of resources. We made connections to types of natural resources in different countries and how this was impacted by national wealth. We looked deeper into developed and developing countries where 4SL carefully selected, researched, and crafted Dioramas to demonstrate their understanding of comparisons between their two countries.

In mathematics, the students are building knowledge in angles and how they can be found in their environment. Protractors have been explored and they discovered how useful they are.

One of the recent highlights of the term was the book parade. So much to choose from to build a love of books and reading. Students continue to investigate the three levels of comprehension to unlock between the line content and beyond the text ideas.

We look forward to the next unit where the students will be looking at the Earth's place in the universe and how technology helps us explore.







T1ET has begun to explore narratives in the second half of this term. Students learnt about the structure of a narrative using the Plot Mountain, having a go at creating their own! Students have also been involved in swimming lessons. It has been great to see students trying their best in the pool and having lots of fun!

5JC's Excursion to Nungalinya College

5JC recently visited Nungalinya College, the premier Combined Churches Training College for Indigenous Australians. Operating since 1974, Nungalinya College has been equipping Indigenous men and women for leadership roles in churches and communities. Each year, men and women from over 100 different communities across Australia travel to study at Nungalinya College.

The excursion enriched Year 5's current Christian Studies unit, learning about the role and purpose of missionaries. The college acted as a real-world example of a missionary service for our students. At the college, year 5 students were also able to inquire further into our current Unit of Inquiry, '*How We Express Ourselves*'. Several Indigenous college students shared their artwork with us, explaining their meanings and the process they went through. Year 5's also produced their own artwork on leaves, guided by the college's artists. Our excursion was completed by sharing a delicious morning tea with Nungalinya students and staff.

Larrikin Cash works just like real cash, and even prints out to look like money! It's set up as an online item where you can simply enter any amount you wish. (Please don't add the actual products to your online cart, just the Larrikin Cash item, as products need to be collected from the book fair)

Once you pass through the checkout, you will then receive an email with your Larrikin Cash, which you can either print out and give to your child, or write the 5 digit code onto the wish list. (If you don't receive the email immediately after checkout, please check your spam/junk mail folder.)

You are effectively buying a voucher that can then be exchanged for any items at the BookFair.

Your child will then bring the Larrikin Cash / Wish List to school and visit the library during the BookFair.

We will also be accepting regular cash and credit card payments on site during the Book Fair too.

Although every effort will be made to ensure your child brings home the correct item/s there could be a lack of stock or change of students' minds.

If there is a discrepancy, please contact us and we will resolve it as best we can.




