Visible Wellbeing Coordinator's Article

Tena Koutou Katoa (Hello to you all)

Here at Good Shepherd Lutheran College Leanyer campus, the teachers are continuing to use restorative practice. Students who are hurt are empowered through sharing their experience, being heard, understood, and can then provide a solution to fix the problem. Students responsible for the hurt are also heard and given the opportunity to make amends.

As teachers and parents, we need to continue to actively teach children personal and social skills to support their friendships, so these are positive and their interactions with their peers have fewer problems.

It is, therefore, important for student wellbeing to enable strategies to help them build good friendships and to know that we don't always get along but that there are ways we can communicate and solve these problems.

The SEARCH framework for wellbeing is practised at our school also and integrated into the classroom programme through units of inquiry. It covers the following concepts: strengths, emotional management, awareness and attention, relationships, coping and habits and goals. These all are important skills to develop throughout your child or children's development.

The development of social skills encourages good relationships and therefore needs to be supported and developed as children grow. Positive social skills develop respectful and positive relationships. Students can learn to empathise with others and value differences. These skills include listening and speaking, cooperating, and collaborating, winning, and losing, being empathetic and supportive of others.

We all can help develop these skills by giving encouragement and practise through activities and games. For example, role play develops such skills as listening and speaking. New games where children must follow rules enables them to cope with losing.

As we are an IB school we can also engage with the learner profiles of knowledgeable, openminded, communicator, thinker, inquirer, risk taker, caring, well balanced, principled, and reflective and practise one or two of the social skills at a time.

Making up games and playing them at home is a terrific way to become involved and continuing to support children's' social skills development so they can continue to build flourishing positive relationships that assists their wellbeing.

Please note that relationships may not be the current pathway focus for your child's class, however, it is still necessary to continue to develop and expand all the pathway skills throughout a child's growth and development.


The school break is a wonderful time to continue developing relationship skills with your child or children. It can be fascinating to watch their creativeness in action.

Chaplain's Chat

This term in Chapel we have been reflecting on the times in scripture where Jesus was counter -cultural. We have focused on the challenges he made to the people of his time and how some of what he challenged them with, can still be challenging to us today. We have explored topics such as Jesus seeing value in children when others didn't; Jesus seeing value in all people and wanting to share meals with outsiders; the challenge of loving your enemies, and the ability to forgive people who have hurt you. These are all things that can be easily said but can be more challenging to act out in real life.

Leading up to Easter we have also explored the question "Why is Good Friday called Good Friday, if it's a time used to reflect on the terrible torment that Jesus faced?"

There seems to be nothing good about that, right? The simple response to this question is: while we do reflect on the horrible things that happened to Jesus on Easter Friday, it is called Good Friday, not because Jesus suffered but because of what his suffering means for us. Because Jesus died on the cross, we don't have to make regular animal sacrifices to be right with God nor do we have to follow a "perfect" person checklist and try to be right with God through our own merit (good deeds). Jesus has done the work on the cross. He is the sacrifice that was required for our wrong doings. It is only through him that we now can have a relationship with God.

This Easter when you have your hot cross buns, and your hollow Easter eggs, use them as a reminder of what the true meaning of Easter is really about. The hot cross buns representing Jesus' death on the cross and the hollow Easter eggs representing the tomb that was empty because Jesus is no longer dead but has risen.

My hope and prayer this Easter is that God will bless each and every family over break and that we would truly reflect on what Jesus has done for us.


